“LITERACY MONTH AND THE BIG READ MONTH IN LOS ANGELES”

Los Angeles – April 2011 will be dedicated as “**Literacy Month and the Big Read Month in Los Angeles**” by the Mayor Antonio R. Villaraigosa and the Los Angeles City Council during a proclamation ceremony at Los Angeles City Hall City Council Chambers, on March 25, 2011, at 10:00 a.m. The **2011 Big Read Program in LA**, produced by the Department of Cultural Affairs, will be officially introduced along with L.A.’s featured book, “**The Joy Luck Club**,” by Amy Tan. Students, schools, cultural and community partners, and participating organizations will be recognized by the City Council, the Mayor, and other elected officials at City Hall.

The Big Read is an initiative of the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA) designed to restore reading to the center of American culture. The NEA presents The Big Read in partnership with the Institute of Museum and Library Services and in cooperation with Arts Midwest. The Big Read brings together partners across the county to encourage reading for pleasure and enlightenment.

Since the inception of The Big Read in 2007/08, the NEA has awarded grants to DCA to program The Big Read locally. DCA marks its third year of programming The Big Read with the 2011 selection of Amy Tan’s novel “*The Joy Luck Club*.” Given that Los Angeles is home to one of the most culturally and ethnically diverse populations, the novel’s themes of family, immigration, and assimilation will resonate and serve as an entry point for dialogue, creative programming, and cultivating new and long standing alliances between education, the arts, and community organizations across Los Angeles.

DCA’s 2011 Big Read Program in LA consists of a series of activities that started in January and will be extended through June, 2011. The program is presented by DCA in conjunction with community and cultural organizations that include: the Chinese American Museum, El Pueblo de Los Angeles Historical Monument, Sony Pictures Media Arts Program, the Chinatown Business Improvement District, the Warner Grand Theater, the Los Angeles Public Library, the Los Angeles Unified School District, the Culinary Historians of Southern California, Zócalo Public Square, East West Players, the California African American Museum, and many more.



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Nearly 3,000 students from local high schools in culturally diverse areas of Los Angeles will join community members in reading “*The Joy Luck Club*,” with activities offered for all ages and interests. The in-school and after-school program features reading groups, and visual-arts and new media classes - culminating in an exhibition of student artwork at DCA’s City Hall Bridge Gallery. The public can participate through public library reading groups, film screenings, a panel discussion, culinary tours, theater workshops, museum programs, a symposium, and special events.

Moderated by Mae Ngai, author and professor, Columbia University.

Nineteenth-century Chinese immigrants to America were regarded with such fear and racism — they were dubbed the “yellow peril” — that the U.S. enacted its first and only anti-immigration law based solely on race. Even after World War II, when Chinese immigration and naturalization was legalized, mainstream perceptions of Chinese Americans remained mired in racist stereotypes of effeminate or outright villainous men, and submissive “geisha girls” or “dragon ladies.” The villain Fu Manchu continued to appear in novels in the 1950s, as did the good-natured but emasculated detective Charlie Chan. Mr. Magoo’s houseboy “Cholly” beamed into American televisions in the 1970s, and foreign exchange student Long Duck Dong appeared on movie screens in “Sixteen Candles.” In the last two decades — as China opened to the U.S., as Chinese immigrants from more provinces traveled across the Pacific, and as “*The Joy Luck Club*” topped bestseller lists and became a hit film — Chinese Americans began to tell their own stories, for themselves and for America at large.



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Zócalo invites a panel of Chinese American scholars and artists to explore the laws, history, culture, and art that made — and that continue to transform — Chinese America.

About the City of Los Angeles Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA)

The **Department of Cultural Affairs (DCA)** generates and supports high-quality arts and cultural experiences for Los Angeles' 4 million residents and 25 million annual visitors. DCA advances the social and economic impact of the arts and assures access to arts and cultural experiences through grant making, marketing, public art, community arts programming, arts education, and partnerships with artists and arts and cultural organizations in neighborhoods throughout the City of Los Angeles.

DCA's operating budget and managed portfolio totaled \$36.7 million in fiscal year 2009/10. It consisted of: \$9.6 million in Transient Occupancy Tax funds; \$12.2 million in funds from the Public Works Improvements Arts Program;



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\$8.6 million from the Private Arts Development Fee Program; \$4.9 million in City related and indirect cost allocations; and \$1.4 million in private and public funds raised during the year. DCA grants approximately \$3 million annually to over 280 artists and nonprofit arts organizations through its long-established Grants Administration Division. DCA provides arts and cultural programming in its numerous neighborhood arts and cultural centers, theaters, and historic sites, and manages several arts and education programs.

The Department also administers the City's Private Arts Development Fee and Public Works Improvements Arts Programs, a portfolio of approximately \$20.8 million in fiscal year 2009/10. In addition, DCA raises outside public and private funds, over \$10.5 million since fiscal year 2007/08, used to re-grant to LA-based arts and cultural organizations for special grant initiatives and to support DCA's special programming and facilities. DCA markets the City's cultural events through development and collaboration with strategic partners, design and production of creative promotional materials, and management of the culturela.org website visited by over 2.7 million people annually.

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
